


Harvest of rice 2022

Harvesting rice in mixed cropping

Introduction

The global price increases of food, materials and energy are affecting many families in Sierra Leone. Own food production seems more important than ever! Flooding and political unrest also caused instability in Sierra Leone's capital Freetown. Fortunately, this had no effect on the situation in the countryside.

Uplands | Mixed cropped farming

The abundant rainfall has ensured a nice growth of the crops. The harvest of the earliest rice has already begun! The other crops such as sorghum and cassava have yet to mature. The downside of the heavy rain, however, is that it is worth drying the rice well so that mold is prevented. Fortunately, earlier in the season, farmers were taught about harvesting and conservation methods.

Swamps | Rice production

Fortunately, we received enough donations to start the new project: rice production in the swamps. At the end of the rainy season, the excess water collects in the low parts of the area and takes valuable nutrients with it. 20 farming families will have the opportunity to grow rice here. After germination and transplantation, the fields already look nice and green. The plants also show 'tillering'. That is the creation of extra shoots in which a riceproducing ear will later grow.

Despite this start, we still have insufficient budget to pay for the cultivation supervision by our agronomist Momodu Sheku Kamara. Will you also contribute to this project?

COVID-19 update Sierra Leone

Worldwide a new rise in COVID-19 cases is occurring. After a peek in last December and january in Sierra Leone the numbers of registered cases have been very low: although the number of registered cases is relatively low with currently 7693 cases and 125 deaths registered, it still influences daily life. And a full vaccination has reached the level of 21% of the 7.5 million inhabitants by June 5th, which is only a third of 61,4% fully vaccination level a worldwide.

Update from the fields mid June 2022

During the recent months
Farmers have completed
manual clearing and stumping
on the twelve acres of farms.
There was a delay in sowing
seeds due to the late coming of
rains in this region. In the past
two weeks sowing/plating of
rice seeds is ongoing by all our
farmers in the twelve acres. An
example of seeds vialbility test
conducted in farmers site can
be seen in attached photos.

In the first week of June three days training sessions were held with farmers on the topics:

- 1. Site selection and manual preparation for high yields production.
- 2. The significance of improved seeds varieties in crops production
- 3. Seeds and fertilizes rate per unit area of farming.

The training was highly appreciated by farmers as new ideas were learnt and are being implemented in on going project activities.

Challenges during the month of June.

1) The Global fuel crisis have significantly affected the Sierra Leone economy. The two fuel increases in the past four months have plunged out economy to a near 100% increase in the cost of all commodities and services. The consequence for us is, that, the already provided project budget will not be enough to cover the higher costs of traveling and other costs for the coming months.

This means that we will need to provide an extension to the project budget.

2) Some of our previous Project beneficiaries have lost all their livelihoods when we stopped supporting them last year!

There is heavy pressure on our program manager by ten former SFG beneficiaries vulnerable church members

whom we could not support in this mixed cropping farming project. Presently they are now requesting that we consider them for a Swamp Rice Production Project when the second cropping season for 2022 commences in September this year.

Unfortunately we currently do not have sufficient funds to meet this cry for help.

Summer campaign

In view of the project situation and the request for an extra cropping project, we are now starting the summer funding campaign,

to reach a target of EUR / USD 2500,=

Retrospect: Ben Bolland

As founder of SFG, Ben started this project in 2016, together with Kapri Turay. The first years of the initial Maize cropping project were very successful, going from 0 to 150 farmerfamilies in three years. Drought, pests and COVID-19 necessitated a change to a mixed cropping farming model. We honor Ben for adopting the initial request for help and we are very grateful for the extension of the foundation through all the difficulties in the past years.

Introduction of Gert Prosman

I live in Tilburg, a city in the south of The Netherlands, together with my wife and our two young daughters; Sara (3)

and Roos (1). My profession is ruminant health care. I work as veterinary surgeon in Oisterwijks surroundings. Prevention of (metabolic) diseases and composing healthy rations are my main areas of focus.

In the SFG-projects I will look for combined strategies:

- 1) Low-risk cropping models as year-round food security for the farmers and their families.
- 2) Searching for interesting crops for trading to generate new money flows.

Of course, I also will pay attention to investigate the added value of introducing more domestic farm animals/ruminants in this ecosystem.

With the help of God, I hope to contribute to a sustainable improvement of the prosperity and happiness of Rochen Malal people.



Worldwide everyone struggles with the COVID-19 visue. Also in Sierra Leone: although the number of registered cases is relatively low with currently 7674 cases and 125 deaths registered, it still influences daily life.

And a full vaccination has only reached a level of 14% of the 7.5 million inhabitants.

Update from the Field.

In early March this year an extended program of four acres costing a little over six million

Leones was proposed by the local Program manager, mr.
Momodu Sheku Kamara.,
following the successful loans recovery from the participating farmers in the previous year 2021.

The proposal was approved by the Board and after providing the additional funds, presently we have **12 acres mixed cropping** farming supporting twenty-four farmers.

Farming activities are on going as per schedule. It is a very labor intensive operation as can be seen on the photos of the farm land below, requiring more labour and farmers investment in cash and food in kind. Farmers formed communal labor groups to support these heavy operations manually.

The required inputs of fertilizer and rice seeds were procured timely for the additional farmers, just in time before prices soared due to the recent political instability world wide.

All the 12 acres farms have been simultaneously worked on by the labor groups which comprises of all 24 member farm families who own the 12 acres farm area. The photo on Top of this report gives you an impression of the farmer families, involved.



Thank you for opening this november 2021 newsletter!

A brief COVID-19 update

Worldwide we still struggle with the COVID-19 visue. Although the number of registered cases in Sierra Leone is relatively low with currently 6401 cases and 121 deaths reported, it still dominates daily life. And the vaccination campaign reached only about 302,686 fully vaccinated people, which is 3,87% of the 7.5 million inhabitants.

Seeds for Growth in the malal chiefdom

After our summer 2021 news letter, our program manager, mr M.S. Kamara continued supports a year covering cropping season project for 14 farmer families, based on intercropping of Rice combined with a few other crops like sorghum, benni, cassave and groundnuts.

Since mid september we received positive updates on the rice harvest, and this gives us hope that the final outcome of this full year support for this way of mixed cropping is becoming a success for the farmers. Mid december 2021 we expect to fulfil a final evaluation, and make new plans for the next year.

Of course the COVID-situation has affected the farming situation in a negative way, still the team is expecting reasonable harvest outcomes, thanks to the combined cropping strategy.

MAFFS/FAO partnership, a new opportunity.

Since summer 2021, the
Government is Sierra Leone, in
partnership with FAO (Food and
Agriculture organizarion of UN),
is preparing for a country wide
network to work with local
NGO's. The aim is to develop a
network which can be activated
as a Quick response team
whenever a disaster has
occured and quick support is
needed for local farmer
families.

Our local project team, named "Seeds for Growth Farmers Association" has applied for an eligible role. During the week of 8 september 2021 a group of 5 MAFFS/FAO experts has visited the local team and has inspected the project and team competencies. The provisional outcome of the visit was a placing on the short-list, but after a few weeks the ruling party seems to have interfered in the short listings. Since that moment no further communication from MAFFS/FAO has been received.
